- 1. Pune/ New Delhi: After a blistering start in June, the southwest monsoon has stuttered, falling far short of normal in the fertile planes of northern and central India as well as parts of Maharashtra, sparking concerns about output of key crops if rainfall does not strengthen in a week.
- 2. Bountiful rainfall in June prompted farmers to speed up crop planting, which remains much higher this time than the last year, but farmers who sowed oilseeds, pulse, cotton and coarse grain in areas with erratic rainfall are beginning to worry.
- 3. "Some districts in Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh have not received sufficient rainfall, which may affect the crop growth," said Suresh Agarwal, president, All India Dal Millers Association.
- 4. Rainfall across India in July, a crucial month for farming, is 9% below normal, with a deficit of 20-27% in parts of northern, central and western India. But there is no need to ring the alarm bell yet as crops will revive if the monsoon revives quickly in these areas.
- 5. "If we receive rainfall during the next 10 days, the situation can remain under control. Also, good increase in area under sowing and good weather condition in Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana and parts of Maharashtra may compensate for any losses in productivity in other states," said Kalantry, a pulses processor from Maharashtra.
- 6. The good news is that rainfall is indeed expected to strengthen in the next two weeks, the Head of longrange forecasting at India Meteorological Department (IMD), Sivananda Pai, told ET. Northern India has seen heavy showers in the past two days. He said monsoon lost momentum because there were no low- pressure area since June 2022.
- 7. "Usually in July, we observe three to four low- pressure areas that help the rains to increase in both intensity and distribution," Pai said.

- 1. Most of us, however, take life for granted. We know that one day we must die, but usually we picture that day as far in the future. When we are in buoyant health, death is all but unimaginable. We seldom think of it. The days stretch out in an endless vista. So we go about our petty tasks, hardly aware of our listless attitude towards life.
- 2. The same lethargy, I am afraid, characterizes the use of all our faculties and senses. Only the deaf appreciate hearing, only the blind realize the manifold blessings that lie is sight. Particularly does this observation apply to those who have lost sight and hearing in adult life. But those who have never suffered impairment of sight or hearing seldom make in all sights and sounds hazily, without concentration and with little appreciation. It is the same old story of not being grateful for what we have until we lose it, of not being conscious of health until we are ill.
- 3. I have often thought it would be a blessing if each human being were stricken blind and deaf for a few days at some time during his early adult life. Darkness would make him more appreciative of sight, silence would teach him the joys of sound.
- 4. Now and then I have tested my seeing friends to discover what they see. Recently I was visited by a very good friend who had just returned from a long walk in the woods, and I asked her what she had observed. "Nothing in particular" she replied, I might have been incredulous had I not been accustomed to such responses, for long ago I became convinced that the seeing see little.
- 5. How was it possible, I asked myself; to walk, for an hour through the woods and see nothing worthy of note? I who cannot see find hundreds of things to interest me through mere touch. I feel the delicate symmetry of a leaf. I pass my hands lovingly about the smooth skin of a silver birch, or the rough shaggy bark of a pine. In spring I touch the branches of trees hopefully in search of a bud, the first sign of awakening Nature after her winter's sleep. I feel the delightful velvety texture of a flower and discover its remarkable convolutions, and something of the miracle of Nature is revealed to me. Occasionally, if I am fortunate I place my hand gently on a small tree and feel the happy quiver of a bird in full song. I am delighted to have the cool waters of a brook rush through my open fingers. To me a lush carpet of pine needles or spongy grass is more welcome than the most luxurious Persian rug. To me the pageant of seasons is a thrilling and unending drama, the action of which streams through my finger tips.

- 1. Amongst all the arts in the home none gives more pleasure and enjoyment than that of flower arrangement. There is no room, though thoughtfully planned and carefully decorated, which will not gain in life and beauty with the addition of a well- placed and well —arranged vase of flowers. Flowers, like pictures and other accessories, may be enjoyed for their mass or their colour. Flowers having intrinsic beauty in their line should be so arranged as to emphasize the quality.
- 2. Flower arrangement is an art in which attempt is made to arrange flower, foliage, plants and flower vases in such a way that all of these when arranged produce harmonious appearance, texture and colour combination. The main objective of flower arrangement is to make the place, where it is going to be placed, cheerfully, life and beautiful. It expresses one's love for beauty.
- 3. The art of flower arrangement has existed ever since sixth century when Chinese- Buddhist priests taught scholars how to arrange plant materials with reverence before the shrines and temples. The Japanese have developed this art to a high degree through their many different schools of flower arrangement. Their influence in this field has been worldwide. Their style of flower arrangement is known as Ikebana. Compared to this, Europeans have adopted mass flower arrangement style. Flower arrangement is the only field in which creative ability can be developed almost by anyone through study and experience. It is a means of cultural development and consequent enrichment of life that can be learned at home without interference with home making.
- 4. Lack of finance is no obstacle in the learning of this art. One can make use of grass, weeds, twigs and leaves growing by the road- side and containers from kitchen such as deep plates and glass- bowls. Water- glass can be used as vases for arranging flowers. Flower arrangement should have beauty. The arranger often tries to express her own moods in her compositions. While planning an arrangement, the selection of a mood, a name or a theme helps to guide it towards a definite personality, expressing one single idea.
- 5. The outline of a flower arrangement should be considered by anyone who is creating or judging it. The basic lines are the circle, the sphere, the triangle, the rectangle and the cube. These lines and forms are modified in flower arrangement. The lines and forms of the flower arrangement depend on line of plant material which is going to be used. The container is chosen which comes out of the some line movement so that arrangement appears as one unit. When the flower vase is taken as the trunk of a tree and lines of flower radiating from it should look like the natural branches of the tree, the whole arrangement should appear like a tree.
- 6. The colour of the plant material and the container should be in harmony with each other. A dominant colour is necessary for adding emphasis and unity in a flower arrangement. If three colours are used, one should be more in quantity, followed by second and third in order. In addition, only one colour should be of brilliant intensity. Different colour schemes may be followed during flower arrangement. The value of the colour is also important in flower arrangement.

- 1. It is surprising that sometimes we don't listen to what people say to us. We hear them, but we don't listen to them. I was curious to know how hearing is different from listening. I had thought both were synonyms, but gradually, I realized there is a big difference between the two words.
- 2. Hearing is a physical phenomenon. Whenever somebody speaks, the sound waves generated reach you, and you definitely hear whatever is said to you. However, even if you hear something, it doesn't always mean that you actually understand whatever is being said. Paying attention to whatever you hear means you are really listening. Consciously using your mind to understand whatever is being said is listening.
- 3. Diving deeper, I found that listening is not only hearing with attention, but is much more than that. Listening is hearing with full attention, and applying our mind. Most of the time, we listen to someone, but our minds are full of needless chatter and there doesn't seem to be enough space to accommodate what is being spoken.
- 4. We come with a lot of prejudices and preconceived notions about the speaker or the subject on which he is talking. We pretend to listen to the speaker, but deep inside, we sit in judgement and are dying to pronounce right or wrong, true or false, yes or no. Sometimes, we even come prepared with a negative mind set of proving the speaker wrong. Even if the speaker says nothing harmful, we are ready to pounce on him with our own version of things.
- 5. What we should ideally do is listen first with full awareness. Once we do that, communication will be perfect and our interpersonal relationship will become so much better. Listening well doesn't mean one has to say the right thing at the right moment. In fact, sometimes if words are left unspoken, there is a feeling of tension and negativity. Therefore, it is better to speak out your mind, but do so with awareness after listening to the speaker with full concentration.
- 6. Let's look at this in another way. When you really listen, you imbibe not only what is being spoken, but you also understand what is not spoken as well. Most of the time we don't really listen even to people who really matter to us. That's how misunderstandings grow among families, husbands and wives, brothers and sisters.

  - h) Special attractions of the Mall-Food court, Gaming zone or Cinema etc.

- i) Innovative facilities.
- j) Parking facilities.
